

Definition of Readers' Advisory

Questions to ask readers



Who is it for?

Establish early who the item is for. Is it for the reader to whom you are speaking, or is the reader asking on behalf of someone else? If the item is for someone else, how old is that person? What are their circumstances? What special requirements might they have?


Open questions

In conversations with readers, it is preferable to ask open-ended questions, that is, questions that can't be answered with a 'yes' or 'no', so that you get the reader to talk, to describe what he or she likes.

The notion of 'appeal characteristics',

Understanding what appeals to you personally will aid you in your search for your next great read. Such characteristics might include storyline, tone, pace, setting, characters and writing style.





















Readers' advisory framework

Meet & greet

- Affirm you can help
- Put customer at ease
- Be aware of how much time is available (yours/customer's)


Customer request

- Establish the requirement (Open questions)
- Clarify the requirement (Closed questions)

Results

- Know your collection; work together; use reference tools; explain what you are doing
- Offer self-help resources to the customer (catalogue, guides, websites, databases)
- Suggest multiple titles, authors
- Follow-up, seek feedback

Keep up-to-date with resources and how to use them effectively. Measure and improve performance.

RA for Gamer patrons

What are the ways to dialogue with your gamer patrons and help them know where to start in your collection.

Players who enjoy first-person shooter (FPS) games like "Fortnite" and "Overwatch" like to be in the middle of the action and allow their innate survival skills to shine.

Try our genres like adventure stories, survival stories, spy stories, or thrillers and suspense.

Role- playing games (RPGs)

The driving force of role- playing games (RPGs) like "Legend of Zelda" and "Dragon Quest" are their rich fantasy worlds and complicated plots. These readers enjoy stories that take them on a fantastical journey with a chosen hero.

Try recommending fantasy fiction with appeals like world-building, descriptive, or lush.

More Gamers ideas

Players who like collection games like "Pokémon" and "Animal Crossing" may gravitate toward quirky and sweeping stories with a large cast of characters.

- Got a "Minecraft" or "Frostpunk" player? Games like these allow players to be architects of their own world.
- . Gamers that get lost in story games like "Undertale" and "Professor Layton" like to follow the clues. Give them mysteries with themes like solve the puzzle or locked room mysteries.
- Retro gamers enjoy the nostalgia of the franchises of the past and those classic pixel styles.
