The library had some wonderful photos from the 1950s of the Bonnie Vale cabin community.










An exhibition was mounted using our reusable frames with Tina's artwork and photos from the library collection.

Shacks of the Royal National Park










Jennifer Rankine saw the exhibition and it prompted memories of her holidays at Bonnie Vale.
