
What is digital preservation?


'Digital preservation' is the coordinated and ongoing set of processes that ensure long term, error free storage of digital information.

There are two forms of digital material



1. Physical objects that have been copied into a digital format

2. Born digital materials are items that exist only in a digital format

How can we protect our digital collections?






The future
